



LECH LECHAH

G-d speaks to Abram, commanding him, “Go from your land, from your birthplace and from your father’s house, to the land which I will show you.” There, G-d says, he will be made into a great nation. Abram and his wife, Sarai, accompanied by his nephew Lot, journey to the land of Canaan, where Abram builds an altar and continues to spread the message of a one G-d.

A famine forces the first Jew to depart for Egypt, where beautiful Sarai is taken to Pharaoh’s palace; Abram escapes death because they present themselves as brother and sister. A plague prevents the Egyptian king from touching her, and convinces him to return her to Abram and to compensate the brother-revealed-as-husband with gold, silver and cattle.

Back in the land of Canaan, Lot separates from Abram and settles in the evil city of Sodom, where he falls captive when the mighty armies of Chedorlaomer and his three allies conquer the five cities of the Sodom Valley. Abram sets out with a small band to rescue his nephew, defeats the four kings, and is blessed by Malki-Zedek the king of Salem (Jerusalem).



G-d seals the Covenant Between the Parts with Abram, in which the exile and persecution (galut) of the people of Israel is foretold, and the Holy Land is bequeathed to them as their eternal heritage.

Still childless ten years after their arrival in the Land, Sarai tells Abram to marry her maidservant Hagar. Hagar conceives, becomes insolent toward her mistress, and then flees when Sarai treats her harshly; an angel convinces her to return, and tells her that her son will father a populous nation. Ishmael is born in Abram’s eighty-sixth year.

Thirteen years later, G-d changes Abram’s name to Abraham (“father of multitudes”), and Sarai’s to Sarah (“princess”), and promises that a son will be born to them; from this child, whom they should call Isaac (“will laugh”), will stem the great nation with which G-d will establish His special bond. Abraham is commanded to circumcise himself and his descendants as a “sign of the covenant between Me and you.” Abraham immediately complies, circumcising himself and all the males of his household.

Egg and meat fritters

Beith b'Laham



Serves 4

250g minced meat or chicken
1 small onion, very finely chopped
5 eggs
2 medium potatoes, finely diced or grated
1 bunch spring onions, very finely chopped
5 tablespoons finely chopped flat parsley
½ teaspoon ground cumin
1 teaspoon curry powder
1 tablespoon olive oil
Sunflower oil for frying
1 teaspoon salt
Pepper to taste

This is a light dish which is very popular with my family. The traditional recipe calls for fried meat fritters but, to save time, you can cook it as one large omelette or tortilla, and slice it as a cake when serving. If you are not a meat lover, soya mince can be substituted.

Steam the diced or grated potatoes until soft. This should take about 10 to 15 minutes. Transfer to a dish, season with salt and pepper and set aside to cool.

Season the meat with the cumin, curry powder, salt and pepper and mix in 1 tablespoon of olive oil.

Beat the eggs in a large bowl and mix in the rest of the ingredients. The mixture should be soft but not watery. The eggs act as a binder, holding all the ingredients together. You can add another egg if necessary.

In a large frying pan, heat 2 tablespoons of oil. Drop a tablespoonful of the mixture into the hot oil, lower the heat to medium-low and lightly flatten the mixture with the back of a spoon. Cook each side until golden brown. Cook in batches, a few at a time, transferring on to kitchen towel to absorb the excess oil.

Serve with a tomato or cucumber salad and some pickles.

Variation 1: You can substitute soya mince instead of the meat. There is a brand called Quorn which you can use straight from the packet. If that is unavailable use dried soya mince. Soak the soya in water for about 20 minutes. Squeeze out all the water, season, and cook as above.

Variation 2: This is a quicker version which also uses less oil. It can be served hot or cold and cut into triangles like a cake. Heat a little oil in a large frying pan (about 23cm). Pour in the egg mixture and cook covered on medium-low heat until the bottom has set and turned golden brown. Then, place under the grill to cook the top.







OPTICAL ILLUSIONS...

This image looks like physicist Albert Einstein. However, move a few feet away from the screen and suddenly it'll transform into Marilyn Monroe.



EINSTEIN

This amazing image looks like physicist Albert Einstein. However, move a few feet away from the screen and suddenly it'll transform into Marilyn Monroe. The work of Aude Oliva and her colleagues at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, the illusion was created in three steps.

First, the researchers obtained a photograph of Marilyn Monroe and removed the fine-grained facial features, such as any wrinkles or other blemishes.

Second, they obtained a photograph of Albert Einstein and removed the more coarse features, such as the shape of the mouth or nose.

Finally, the two images were superimposed on top of one another. Because the fine-grained features are visible close up, the image looks like Albert Einstein when you're just a few inches away from the page. However, move a few feet away and suddenly only the coarse features are visible, magically transforming the image into Marilyn Monroe

IMPOSSIBLE TRIANGLE

The dice appear to form an impossible triangle. Your eyes and brain are fooled because they assume that all of the corners of the triangle are touching one another. In reality, the photograph has been taken from a very specific angle. If the position of the camera was to shift slightly, you would see that in reality the 'triangle' is actually created by three lines of dice arranged in the shape of the letter 'Z'. As such, one of the 'corners' in the photograph actually consists of two ends that are a very long way apart. This idea is based on a drawing of an impossible triangle originally created by physicist Roger Penrose in 1954.
